The Tennessee Center for Performance Excellence (TNCPE) has presented its highest honor to Maury Regional Medical Center (MRMC). CEO Alan Watson accepted the TNCPE Excellence Award during an awards ceremony on March 11 in Franklin.

"I am proud of the employees, physicians, board of

trustees, advisory board, foundation board and volunteers for their dedication and the vital role they serve in making the medical center an organization committed to the constant pursuit of excellence in patient care, service and operations," said Watson.

TNCPE uses the Criteria for Performance Excellence established by the Baldrige National Quality Program to evaluate and recognize organizations that have achieved the highest standards of excellence. MRMC was evaluated in seven categories: leadership; strategic planning; customer focus; measurement, analysis and knowledge management; workforce focus; process management; and results.

This is the second time that MRMC has earned the Excellence Award, having also

received the honor in 2009.

MRMC hosts Planetree webinar

MRMC recently hosted a webinar to share successes of the new financial navigation program offered to patients of the Cancer Center.

The webinar on March 11 was shared through Planetree, Inc., by Patient Access Director Rodney Adams, Infusion Center Manager Debra Lyons, NP, and Financial Navigator Amanda Holt.

MRMC developed a formal and comprehensive financial navigation program at the Cancer Center in 2014. In collaboration with a clinical nurse navigator, the financial navigator meets with patients to discuss their financial situation, investigate eligibility for financial support and provide assistance for enrolling in assistance programs for medical and prescription expenses.

In the program's first seven months, the medical center helped to decrease out-of-pocket expenses for patients by more than \$330,000. As an added benefit, reimbursements are increased for the care that the medical center provides.

"This program helps to relieve some of the uncertainty and financial stress that our patients face so they can focus on managing their care and healing," said Adams.

Planetree celebration planned for April 24

Employees, volunteers and physicians are invited to celebrate the recent designation of MRMC as a Planetree Designated[®] Patient-Centered Hospital on Friday, April 24. The celebration will be held from 1 until 3 p.m. on the medical center's front lawn.

MRMC was formally recognized by Planetree, Inc. in February and is one of only 28 hospitals in the United States, and the first in Tennessee, to receive the Patient-Centered Designation.



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Team trains for high-risk care unit

A specialized team of caregivers has been formed at MRMC as part of the medical center's plan to care for a patient with a highly contagious disease, such as Ebola, according to Infection Control Director Lynnelle Murrell.

The Contagious Disease Unit (CDU) team includes employees and physicians who would care for patients who exhibit symptoms of diseases that require specialized care in an isolated environment. Approximately 25 staff members, including registered nurses, respiratory therapists and nurse technicians volunteered for the team along with physicians trained in emergency medicine and critical care.

"The employees and physicians who have volunteered to be

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part of this team are some of our best caregivers as well as innovators and critical thinkers who are willing to learn the latest methods of treatment of some of the world's most serious diseases," said Murrell. "We would depend on them to not only provide outstanding care, but also to give input on the processes we are using so that we can constantly improve."

Members of the team would provide all functions of care, including X-ray, laboratory and EKGs, as well as environmental services tasks and delivery of meal trays.

A secure area within the Emergency Department would be used as the treatment area with access limited to team members trained in the proper use of personal protective equipment (PPE), handling of medical waste and cleaning procedures.

"One of the most important and unique parts of the team's work is the training designed to help keep one another safe throughout the care process," said Dr. Deborah Goldsmith, an infectious disease specialist at MRMC.

calibrating the complex linear accelerators that deliver radiation therapy. Radiation oncology will occupy a 12,600 square foot space that includes treatment suites, exam rooms, treatment planning areas and offices. The mobile positron emission tomography (PET) unit will also be located at the Cancer Center once the consolidation is complete in June.

The Cancer Center features a tranquil garden space, cancer resource center and is home to a monthly cancer support group for patients and family members.

An open house will be held once consolidation of services is complete.

"When you lose someone you dearly love to cancer, you become keenly aware of the challenges that are faced by the patients, their families and friends. The Foundation provides assistance to cancer patients through the Cancer Fund, Women's Center Fund and Special Needs Fund. For those who qualify, assistance is available for transportation expenses, mammograms, camisoles, lymphedema compression garments, wigs, headwear and other necessities. In addition, the Foundation maintains The Retreat, a hospitality house that provides daytime accommodations for cancer patients.
